



ANTIGUA AND BARBUDA

CITIZENSHIP BY INVESTMENT

Antigua and Barbuda is located in the Leeward Islands, which forms part of the Eastern Caribbean. Antigua is the larger of the islands with an area of 108 square miles (280 km²) with Barbuda being 68 square miles (176 km²). The third island Redonda is an uninhabited nature reserve with an area of only 0.6 square miles (1.6km²). The capital city of Antigua is Saint John's and the largest city in Barbuda is Codrington. The country, which is primarily of limestone composition is not surprisingly known for having some of the finest white sand beaches in the Caribbean. In fact, it boasts 365 beaches and these, coupled with the abundance of sunshine year-round make Antigua and Barbuda a very desirable place in which to live, work and vacation

POPULATION

Antigua and Barbuda is a very small country in the Atlantic Ocean near Puerto Rico. Nicknamed the "Land of 365 Beaches," it has the 4th smallest population in the world with an estimated 2018 population of 103,050. The country consists of two main inhabited islands -- Antigua and Barbuda -- that are miles apart, along with many small islands. Antigua and Barbuda have an estimated population of 103,050, which makes it the 199th most populous country in the world. Despite its small population, it has a fairly high population density with 186 people per square kilometer (481/square mile).



LAND AND CLIMATE

Antigua and Barbuda has a tropical climate, hot and humid all year round, with a relatively cool and dry season from January to mid-April, and a hot, humid and rainy season from mid-June to mid-November. In the former period, the northeast trade winds, constant winds typical of tropical climates, blow steadily and with moderate intensity, while in the latter period the winds are more irregular, and may have some breaks, increasing the feeling of sultriness. Antigua and Barbuda both are generally low-lying islands whose terrain has been influenced more by limestone formations than volcanic activity. The highest point on Antigua is Mount Obama (formerly Boggy Peak), the remnant of a volcanic crater rising 402 metres (1319 ft). This mountain is located amid a bulge of hills of volcanic origin in the southwestern part of the island.



ECONOMY

Antigua and Barbuda's economy is service-based, with tourism and government services representing the key sources of employment and income. Tourism accounts directly or indirectly for more than half of GDP and is also the principal earner of foreign exchange in Antigua and Barbuda.



TRAVEL BY AIR

V.C. Bird International Airport, on the northern coast of Antigua near St. Johns, is the primary hub for international and Caribbean entry into Antigua or Barbuda. Due to the steady increase in tourism to Antigua and Barbuda, the Ministry of Tourism decided to expand the size of V.C. Bird International Airport. Travelers are able to fly directly from Europe, The UK, The U.S and Canada.
